Airline boosts services

NEWCASTLE Airport will begin hosting services from Australia's largest independent airline from the end of this month.

Regional airline Regional Express (also known as Rex) unveiled several planned services from Williamtown yesterday, including several flights between Sydney and Newcastle each day.

The services will add three round-trip journeys between Newcastle and Sydney to Newcastle Airport's schedule as

Newcastle to Sydney: Departs 8.20am. 11.50am and 6.10pm weekdays. 7am and 5pm Saturday, 2.15pm and 5pm Sunday. Sydney to Newcastle: Departs 7.15am.

Sydney (45 mins)

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2.15pm and 5pm weekdays. 8.45am and 6.10pm Saturday, 4.40pm and 6.10pm Sunday. Ballina (80 mins) Newcastle to Ballina:

Departs 3.20pm weekdays, 8.05am Saturday and 3.20pm Sunday. Ballina to Newcastle: Departs 10.10am weekdays, 7.05am Saturday and 3pm Sunday.
